## THE HUMAN ONE Art Exhibition

3<sup>rd</sup>– 20<sup>th</sup> June 2025 at Ashburnham Church

St Peter's Parish Church, Ashburnham, will be the location for a profound and inspiring Art Exhibition for two weeks this June. The

Human One's of thirty paintings by Jeremy Thomas, Artist in Residence at St Mary's Priory, a collection Abergavenny. Inspired to retell the story of Jesus' Life, Death and Resurrection, Jeremy writes: "On a sunny Sunday morning in September 2018 a seed was sown. Like most seeds, it started off rather small and primitive... as the research began and the thumbnail drawings doodles and notes started to fill my " sketchbook, the concept became much clearer and much larger in scope, a commitment that would take several years to complete. Within just a few weeks this small journey had grown into something of a pilgrimage, complete with " highs, lows... and lockdowns! After much deliberation settled on the notion to – produce thirty images, one for each piece of silver that was Paid to Judas Iscariot for the betrayal of Jesus. Echoing this idea, each painting would include thirty pieces of silver, often hidden within the image, sometimes within the rain, the stars or the dust as it catches the light. The paintings are full of other hidden details too, often becoming visible as you delve below the surface." Through the medium of oils, and complimented by poetry, this Art Exhibition is free and can be accessed Tuesday to Saturday between 10:30 am and 4 pm, at Ashburnham Church, between 3<sup>rd</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> June.
